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KCHEA Completes Kentucky Oral History Project Grant

The Kentucky Craft History & Education Association (KCHEA) recently completed a Kentucky Oral History Commission Project Grant as part of its ongoing Craft Luminary Project. The grant provided for the filming of new oral history interviews with six craft artisans across the state in FY 2024-2025.

The purpose of the Craft Luminary Project is to document and preserve the personal stories of individuals who have made significant contributions and impacts to Kentucky's craft movement and history through video oral history interviews. In a world now bombarded with artificially generated content, each of these artists takes inspiration from the natural world and patterns we find around us. These video interviews do something that A.I. cannot do. They preserve the stories, methods, and makers of original and creative craft in their entirety and add to the continuum of craft history in a meaningful and significant way.
